Mr. Taylor went over to the Grumman factory at Farmingdale and returned in a F3 Fl U.S. Navy fighter biplane, which is powered with a Pratt & Whitney 650 h.p. engine and equipped with retractable landing gear. "Jimmy", who is one of the best pilots flying today, gave an impressive exhibition of this remarkable little ship's maneuverability and speed. Messrs. Millar and Taylor had lunch at the Field Restaurant and visited officials of Air Associates.

Walter Beech, designer and manufacturer of Beechcraft airplanes, arrived at Roosevelt Field Sunday from Wichita, Kansas, in a new Wright powered Beechcraft which has been purchased by the U.S. Navy. Newman Wadlow, test pilot for the Beech Aircraft Company, was at the controls and the trip was made in 6 hours and 8 minutes. After the radio equipment in the plane has been checked by Aeronautical Radio Company, delivery will be made at Washington.

Flying his Lockheed Vega, "The Crystal City", Joe Costa took off from Roosevelt Field last week for his home at Corning, N.Y. After spending a few days with his family, he left Sunday on his goodwill flight to Brazil.

Ralph De Palma, world famous automobile race driver, visited his old friends "Becky" Havens and "Dick" Depew, local Fairchild airplane and Ranger engine representatives, at Roosevelt Field.
