

out of date, but he was a serious scholar at the LSE. Under the radar, Elizabeth worked hard, particularly in the Commonwealth, to fight apartheid and work with African and Asian leaders to achieve better outcomes for people in poor countries. A lot of this work is not well known, but the high regard in which she was held by Nelson Mandela, Barack Obama (grandson of a British army cook in Kenya), Julius Nyrerye of Tanzania, etc., is testimony to how hard she worked out of the limelight to accomplish good things. There is an amazing picture of her dancing arm in arm with Kwame Nkrumah, the first president of Ghana (and recent British prisoner) during Independence celebrations in 1957. It would have gotten them both lynched in Mississippi in that era had it happened there. Her willingness to forgive and forget when she shook hands with the IRA commander Martin McGuinnes was also remarkable. She was not just a warm and fuzzy grandmother." Bob Whitcomb commented, "A fixed point of graciousness, dignity, and duty." And Rich Blossom followed with "Hear, hear. She was an amazing woman." A bigger challenge in the Commonwealth countries is facing their new King Charles III. Bob Adams shared his "two cents given that

for not quite 28 years, I have lived in Australia where the 'love/hate' relationship between the Aussies and the 'Poms' continues to animate the nation's capital in Canberra, every state and territory parliament, and every sporting contest between these two cheerfully, rabidly, determined rivals." He also asked if "any of you, have you worked at the same job for 70 years? Yes, her Royal Highness enjoyed privileges and 'hot and cold running' assistance wherever and whenever she snapped her fingers the likes of which none of us, well most of us, will never know. Just the same—and please know that the debate about Australia becoming a republic continues to animate innumerable conversations any number of which emanate in Canberra; however much you believe that she was the monarch (head of state, not a butterfly) of a nation (an empire in eclipse) that rapaciously traduced numerous nation-states, cultures, and environments; she rarely 'put a foot wrong' as many Aussies are wont to say."


